Recent Highlights – September

September started off with changeable westerly winds. The weather gradually settled down after the 6th, and from the 13th to 20th there was a lot of fine sunny weather, but during the last third of the month it turned increasingly showery and wet.

The mean temperature for the month was provisionally 0.5 °C above the long-term average. Due mainly to the very wet end of the month, rainfall was 159% of average, making it the wettest September since 1999. Numerous sunny days around mid-month ensured that sunshine totals were also above average, with 120% of average for Wales as a whole, though many nights were clear and cool.

Painted Lady

The first half of September 2019 saw a continuing abundance of the Painted Lady butterfly (*Vanessa cardui*), usually on buddleia flowers, but by the third week of the month it had almost disappeared save for a few worn individuals. Studies in recent years have shown that the Painted Lady migrates south each autumn - but makes this return journey at high altitude out of view of butterfly observers on the ground. Radar records have revealed that Painted Ladies fly at an average altitude of over 500 metres on their southbound trip and can clock up speeds of 30 mph by selecting favourable conditions. In the course of a year, this species travels 12,000 km and crosses the Sahara Desert twice to seasonally exploit resources and favourable climates. The whole journey is not undertaken by individual butterflies but is a series of steps by up to six successive generations so Painted Ladies returning to Africa in the autumn are several generations removed from their ancestors who left Africa earlier in the year. The figures show a small inward migration in June, whose offspring combined with further major immigration to produce a peak in numbers in late July/ August, followed by a rapid decline at the time of return migration.

Other Butterflies

17 butterfly species were recorded in September 2019, the highest since 2015; 139 Large White, 89 Small White, 66 Red Admiral and a pleasing recovery of Small Tortoiseshell with 69 individuals. 4 immigrant Clouded Yellow, Brown Argus and Wall Brown were other notable records.

Three More Clifden Nonpareil Moths

The first VC35 record of Clifden Nonpareil (*Catocala fraxini*) was to light at Undy on the night of 25th/26th September 2018 (see newsletter issue 145). Almost exactly a year later three more specimens have turned up, all to light:

21st September in the north of the county at Hendre (Great Crwys) by Wendy Tyler-Batt

24th September at Tintern by Hazel Mitchell, with another clearly different specimen the following night, 25th, at the same site.

An aspen feeder, the species was a former resident in Kent and the Norfolk broads in the 1930's and has recolonised southern England from 2007, spreading remarkably quickly. In the latest newsletter from neighbouring Gloucestershire, Roger Gaunt reports that nine recorders have seen one or more specimens during September.

Other moths

129 species of macro moth were recorded in Gwent in September 2019, much lower than the 147 of September 2018 but identical to September 2017. One Cosmopolitan, one Scarce Bordered Straw and five Dark Sword-grass were the only migrant records.






