November - December

November was a mostly cloudy month with showery rain at times, but there were occasional cold bright days with overnight frosts. Most of the month was colder than average but it was mild on the first four days and again between the 23rd and 27th. The mean temperature for the month was provisionally 0.8 °C below the long-term average. Rainfall was 106% of average and sunshine was just 76% of average.

December overall was rather mild, with only limited colder interludes and fewer frosts than average. Low pressure and the regular passage of frontal systems produced some large daily rainfall totals during the first three weeks but the final Xmas week was rather drier in most areas, and it became quite mild at times.

The paucity of sunshine meant butterflies were a rarity, the only records for the two months being:

5th Nov Three Red Admirals on ivy blossom at Magor Marsh. (Martin Anthoney and Roger James)

12th Nov One Red Admiral at Goldcliff lagoons. (Kevin Dupé)

16th Nov One Red Admiral at Llandogo (Gail Reynolds)

25th Dec A pleasant Xmas day produced a Red Admiral and a Peacock butterfly sunning themselves on a wall near Cleddon. (Stephanie Tyler)

29th Dec A Peacock butterfly flying in Cwmyoy churchyard. (Christine Knight)
Also, a Red Admiral flying at Harlech Retail Park, Newport. (Nick Felstead)

35 species of macro moth were recorded in November, well below the 50 species of Nov 2018, and 13 species in December was again well below the 21 species of Dec 2018. Highlights included:

Summary of 2019 Butterflies and Macro moths

Butterflies

37 species of butterfly were recorded in Gwent in 2019, the same number as in 2018. The year will be remembered for its abundance of Painted Ladies. The first specimen appeared on 21st Feb and numbers built up slowly to late July when a population explosion reached a peak in August and early September. Painted Lady was the commonest butterfly, with counts of 100+ not uncommon. As the reverse migration southwards set in, numbers fell back rapidly so only five individuals were recorded in October.

After an early appearance on 17th Jan, Red Admiral numbers built up to have a good summer, but hardly any survived the cool autumn into winter. Immigrant Clouded Yellows usually appear in the autumn, but disappointingly only six individuals were recorded this year, from late Aug to early Oct. on the coast.

Macro Moths

472 species of macro-moth were recorded in Gwent in 2019, less than the 2018 figure of 481. The average annual count for the decade 2010-2019 was 448 species, with the figure slowly edging up. Whether this is due to more recording, new arrivals and/or climate change is a moot point.

Two new macro moths were added to the VC35 list in 2019: Pine Hawk (*Sphinx pinastri*) at Dingestow on 28th July and Gypsy Moth (*Lymantria dispar*) at Undy on 19th Aug.

Amongst the immigrants, 40 Humming-bird Hawks was the highest total for several years, 2 Bedstraw Hawk, 1 Convolvulus Hawk, 1 Cosmopolitan, 30 Dark Sword-grass, 1 Pearly Underwing, 2 Scarce Bordered Straw, 5 Vestal, 2 White-point and of course the ubiquitous Silver Y. Hopefully, 5 Clifden Nonpareil may indicate a new colonist rather than migrants.
