

Thanks to the efforts of Dave Slade at SEWBReC, our local record centre for SE Wales, a new website has been set up to cover the lepidoptera of Gwent/ Monmouthshire / Vice County 35. The new website complements the existing Gwent Mothing Blog <u>http://gwentmothing.blogspot.co.uk/</u>

Gwent mothing blog: allows people to submit recent highlights and contains archives of The Silurian Newsletter, distribution maps for butterflies and moths and accounts of the history of lepidoptera recording in Gwent.

Gwentleps website: allows access to a gallery of nearly seven hundred photos of Gwent specimens of macro moths and micro moths. It also enables the Gwent datasets (up to 2020) of verified macro moth records (Martin Anthoney) and verified micro moth records (Sam Bosanquet) to be interrogated. It is hoped that butterfly photos and dataset will be added to the website within a few weeks.

The website is still under development, but the main features are working and we welcome people trying out the website and let us know any comments:-

Go to <u>http://www.gwentleps.org.uk/</u> When the website opens, ignore "*log on*" and click on *Moths* on the black bar.

Enter a moth name in the box marked Keyword.

Click to get "*more info*" as appropriate, when distribution maps (adjustable to 10km, 2km or 1km resolution) should appear together with a list of all the Gwent records for that species.

The "Gallery" tab on the black bar enables you to look at 700 photos of Gwent macro moth and micro moth specimens.

September and October

September

The first part of the month was cloudy and quiet, but it was often fine and warm after that, briefly very warm on the 7th/8th, but some rain in the second week, before a marked change to cooler rainy weather for the last few days. Mean temperatures for the month were provisionally 2.0 °C above average, the third warmest September on record. Most of Wales was close to average for both rainfall and sunshine, though a few spots were rather wetter, and the south slightly duller. There was 99% of average rainfall overall, and 95% of average sunshine.

The month produced reports for 16 species of butterfly and a September record of 170 species of macro moth. The corresponding figures for Sept 2020 were 15 and 140.

October

The first few days of the month were unsettled, often windy, but reasonably mild, before it became drier for a time. There was further rain after mid-month, some of it heavy and persistent in the closing days, and it was colder around the 21st to 23rd and the 29th to 31st. Mean temperatures for the month were provisionally 1.6 °C above average, with minima higher relative to average than maxima. The north-west corner of Wales was much wetter than average, and much of the country had a rather dull month. There was 123% of average rainfall overall, and 83% of average sunshine.

October produced 10 butterfly species and 79 macro moths, both fairly typical figures. For comparison the Oct 2020 figures were 9 butterflies and 80 macro moths. However, though the number of species was maintained, the numbers of individual butterflies were very low, particularly the Vanessids such as Red Admiral and Peacock.

September and October Highlights

1st Sept The first Clifden Nonpareil moths of 2021 came to light at Penallt (Ian Rabjohns) and at Tintern (John Dawson).
From 1st September to 17th October, 23 Clifden Nonpareil individuals were recorded at 9 sites.

Pinion-streaked Snouts were also recorded at the same four sites.


